Dear Members,

As the freshly appointed Head of the Nuclear Medicine Department at CHU UCL Namur (Godinne), I would like to submit my candidacy for the vacant position of board member of the Belgian Society of Nuclear Medicine.

Nuclear medicine is at an exciting crossroads. Over the past decades, technological and scientific advancements have transformed hybrid imaging into an essential tool for managing a wide range of patients, particularly in oncology, cardiology, and neurology. - Securing the future of our specialty by fostering generational transitions—not just to maintain excellence in our clinical, academic, and scientific endeavors, but more importantly, to ensure optimal care for our patients.
- 2. Strengthening our **leadership in metabolic therapies** to protect our field from being absorbed by other specialties—a fate that befell ultrasound, once a stronghold of radiology
- Intensifying inter-site, inter-university, and inter-generational collaborations to
 promote the exchange of knowledge and expertise, ensuring our scientific society
 thrives in the years to come with a shared and so reasonable investment of time and
 money.

I bring to this mission 18 years of experience in German-speaking academic institutions, first in radiology and later in nuclear medicine. Along the way, I've become fluent in five languages, such as French (mother tongue), German (mother tongue-level), English, Spanish, and Lingala.

Joining the board would also be an excellent opportunity to meet and collaborate with the colleagues who drive this scientific community forward.

Looking forward to the opportunity of working together and building the nuclear medicine of tomorrow.
